Based on what you brainstormed above, and the scenario presented in the video, answer the following independently, then discuss with your neighbor/small group, as your teacher instructs.

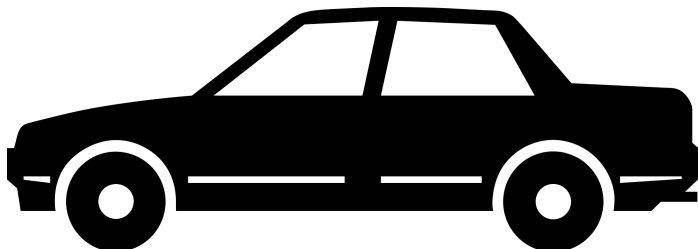
1. What evidence would you want to collect from the crime scene?
